Token	Meaning

\+	literal "+"

1?	optional (zero or one): the literal "1"
[\s\ -]?	optional (zero or one): any of: whitespace, "-"
\d{2,3}	between 2 and 3 times: digit (0–9)
[\s\ -]?	optional (zero or one): any of: whitespace, "-"
\d{3,4}	between 3 and 4 times: digit (0–9)
[\s\ -]?	optional (zero or one): any of: whitespace, "-"
\d{4}	exactly 4 times: digit (0–9)
\$	end of string (or line in multiline mode)

Quick usage in 7 languages

Common pitfalls

- **Anchored to the whole string.** This pattern uses ^ and \$, so it requires the entire input to match. To find it inside a longer text, drop the anchors and use the global (g) flag.
- **Escape it correctly per language.** In Java and JavaScript strings each backslash must be doubled (\\d); in Python, Go, and C# use raw/verbatim strings so the backslashes survive.
- **Validate beyond format.** Matching the format doesn't guarantee the value is real. Confirm the mexican phone (+52) against a source of truth (database, API, or checksum) where it matters.
